Planning Your Child's Education



1. Before your child gets in school:

- Consider the plan you have for your child for the future.
- List your child's strengths, needs, interests and your major concerns.

2. As your child gets in school:

- You will be asked to come to Parent/Teacher conferences.
- You are in charge of making sure homework is being done.
- 3. At the Parent/Teacher conferences, if you hear your child needs extra help:
 - Ask what has been working and what has not.
 - Ask what you can do at home to help.
 - Refer your child for a special education evaluation, if needed.
- 4. If your child is getting special education services:
 - You will be asked to attend an Individualized Educational Program (IEP) meeting.
 - Your job is to ask questions, listen, and tell them your concerns.
 - Your child's IEP should be followed.
 - If you have any problems, ask for an IEP meeting.
 - Keep written records of meetings, phone calls, and conversations

- 7. Remember, all children have the right to a free and appropriate education. It is your job to make sure that your child's special needs are being met.
