KEYNOTE - Supported Decision-Making: From Justice for Jenny to Justice for All! 8:45 AM-9:45 AM

Purpose:

Study after study shows that when people with disabilities make more decisions - when they have more self-determination - they have better lives. Yet, people with disabilities continue to be placed in overbroad or undue guardianships, with studies showing that the majority of young adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities have quardians. Using the "Justice for Jenny" case as an example and guide, this session will show how people can use Supported Decision-Making to work with trusted friends, family members, and professionals who help them understand their situations and choices so they may make their own decisions, avoid overbroad or undue guardianship, and enhance their quality of life.

- 1) Define what self-determination is and how studies show it is the key to maximizing quality of life for people with disabilities.
- Describe how overbroad and undue guardianship can remove rights, decrease self-determination, and lead to negative life outcomes.
- Explain how increasing self-determination leads to better life outcomes, including increased independence, employment, community integration, and safety for people with disabilities.
- 4) Identify what Supported Decision-Making is and how it can increase self-determination and be an effective and appropriate alternative to overbroad and undue guardianship.
- Summarize ways people with disabilities, families, and professionals can plan for and implement Supported Decision-Making.

A5 - Best Practices in Health Care Transition 10:00 AM-11:00 AM

Purpose:

Provide general guidelines for provider best practices on Health Care Transition and youth preferences for transition planning. Educate health professionals on key components of transition planning and how to incorporate transition in their daily busy practice. A6 - "Discovery"- Oriented Services for Young Adults with Mental Health Needs 10:00 AM-11:00 AM

Purpose:

This interactive presentation describes how Thresholds implemented two multidisciplinary community-based care models for transitionage youth with mental health needs and early psychosis. Emerge and MindStrong provides clinical, vocational, peer, and community support. Positive outcomes and Threshold's advocacy efforts informed state legislation that can increase accessibility to these models across Illinois.

- Differentiate "emerging adulthood" from other developmental phases in the life span and learn a) how serious mental health conditions impact this time of marked instability and exploration, and b) why specialty services are critical for this vulnerable population.
- 2) Recognize how Thresholds developed and implemented transition-age youth-specific community service teams through blending and adapting evidence-based practices and leveraging funding sources in a way that can be replicable by other providers.
- Describe the Emerge and MindStrong Models, which include psychiatric, clinical, vocational, peer, and community support elements, and illustrate positive clinical and vocational outcomes.
- 4) Describe Thresholds' successful advocacy in contributing to new state legislation to increase the accessibility of multidisciplinary, community-based care for adolescents and young adults with serious mental health needs. Learn how this legislation can lead to other providers across Illinois in building similar services.

Current data shows only 28.3% of youth with special healthcare needs in Illinois received the services necessary to make the transition to adult health care, while 18.6% of youth without special healthcare needs received the necessary transition services. Join us to learn how DSCC can support health care teams in the initial development& implementation of evidence-based HCT improvement. Health Care practices are partnering with the Division of Specialized Care for Children's (DSCC) transition team on implementing the Six Core Elements of Health Care Transition (HCT).
